RESTRUCTURING: GOOD NUMBERS IN THE USA

ast year at this time there were nearly 683,000 hams licensed by the FCC. As of October this year, there are 2235 fewer—but numbers are not always what they seem. The reality is that ham radio in the United States is growing once again.

First, the General and Extra class have increased substantially since the 13 and 20 word per minute Morse code exams were eliminated April 15 of 2000. In fact, the number of people holding these licenses has increased by well over 25,000 for each license class. And that's great news for ham radio equipment suppliers since they rely on higher dollar high frequency transceiver sales for much of their yearly income.

The Technician class is holding its own, too. The number of new Tech license holders is keeping pace with the number of hams either upgrading or dropping out of amateur radio. The net change is close to zero.

Only the Novice and Advanced classes are seeing significant drops in numbers. No new Novice or Advanced class tickets have been issued since April, 2000. And while existing licenses can be modified and renewed, it appears as if that's just not happening among Novices. They appear to be fading away, and quickly — there were 65,000 Novices in 1997 — only about 37,000, though, today.

The bottom line is that for the last 12 months ham radio has seen an average of 1600 brand new ham licenses issued each month. That's an improvement of 160 a month over the previous year. And that improvement is very good news for ham radio.

As to the state with the largest number of hams? It's still California which can now claim being home to more than one seventh of all the nation's hams. Latest figures show there are more than 100,000 hams now living in California.

The state with the fewest hams? North Dakota — only 1575 hams there.

The bottom line is this. Restructuring seems to be doing the job it was intended to do. It's now up to those in the hobby to work to swell its ranks even more.



WORDS OF WISDOM FROM KING SOLOMON

The Widow's Son

n Ancient Craft Masonry, the title applied to Hiram, the architect of the Temple, because he is said, in the 1st book of Kings (vii 14) to have been "a widow's son of the tribe of Naphtali." The Adonhiramite Masons have a tradition which Chapron gives (Necessaire Maconn., p.101) in the following words: "The Masons call themselves the widow's sons, because, after the death of our respectable Master, the Masons took care of his mother, whose children they called themselves, because Adonhiram had always considered them as his brethren. But the French Masons subsequently changed the myth and called themselves 'Sons of the Widow,' and for this reason. 'As the wife of Hiram remained a widow after her husband was murdered, the Masons, who regard themselves as the descendents of Hiram, called themselves Sons of the Widow." But this myth is a pure invention, and is without the Scriptural foundation of the York myth, which makes Hiram himself the widow's son. But in French Masonry the term "son of the Widow" is synonymous with "Mason."

The adherents of the exiled house of Stuart, when seeking to organize a system of political Masonry by which they hoped to secure the restoration of the family to the throne of England, transferred to Charles II the tradition of Hiram Abiff betrayed by his followers, and called him "the Widow's Son," because he was the son of Henrietta Maria, the widow of Charles I. For the same reason they subsequently applied the phrase to his brother, James II.

he FCC is asking a California ham why he allegedly ran a radio call-in show on 3.830 MHz and requested shortwave listeners to participate. The regulatory agency alleges that **James C. Watkins, KI6GU**, of Burbank ran such an operation last August 16 and 24 and used a reverse autoptach system to facilitate the call-ins.

Along with the FCC inquiry Watkins was furnished 9 pages of material relating to the complaints against him. He was given the customary 30 days from the date of the Commission inquiry to respond.

The abbreviations cover the field from "a"—the abbreviation for "atto," the prefix for 10 to the minus 18th—to the Greek letter Omega, the symbol for ohm(s).

Also posted is a list of corrections that will appear as: "Feedback" http://www.arrl.org/qst/feedback/ items in QST.

SOME BIRTHPLACES OF FREEMASONRY

The Cathedral Building Age - the vital part of the Medieval years - sprung from Gothic Architecture, and a pietism, a reverence, a desire to bring the greatest and best in art and the poetry of architecture to the service of God.

In these great tasks - there are at least fifteen hundred Cathedral Abbeys, Cloisters and other ecclesiastical structures in Europe - workmen of many kinds were engaged. Looking at the marvels they constructed, it is difficult to believe that their building materials were only wood and stone, and that they had no resources of power except their own bodies, the strength of beasts and the multiplication of effort afforded by the pulley and the rope. No electricity, no steam, no gas or oil engine hoisted the stones to the towers of Westminster. No stone cutting machines sawed the rock and no compressed air pumps powered stone carving tools for the delicate lacery of the reredos of Winchester. It was *all* hand work.

Today workers engaged in building are classified according to their skills; in the erection of an office building, for instance, there are iron workers, electricians, carpenters, glaziers, tile layers, plasterers, roofers, tin workers, engineers, plumbers - but all are, in one sense, builders.

In the Middle Ages there were many classifications of masons, quarrymen, layers, scapplers (who rough-shaped and polished), hewers, rough masons and carvers.

These workmen were cutters and layers of stone, smoothers of ashlers, layers and mortar mixers. There were carpenters and stone cutters, stained glass experts and tilers for the roof. Humble workmen fetched and carried and skilled tool makers made and sharpened tools. Records indicate that many masons working on a Cathedral were paid different rates, which, in those days as in this, show that many different skills were required.

Knoop and Jones have shown that at the building of one structure in 1304, fifty-three masons were employed at thirteen different rates of pay; ten years later, twenty-four masons received twelve different rates of pay. At Ely (England) in 1360 nine masons received seven different rates of pay; ten years later at York twenty-nine masons received five different rates of pay.

And over all were the Freemasons.


