WHY NO TOOLS OF IRON?

ome fantastic tales have been told about King Solomon's Temple which is the principal symbol of Freemasonry and the basis for rituals of Craft, Capitular and Cryptic Freemasonry.

The cost of this great structure has been placed by several students of biblical history at figures that seem to surpass the total wealth of that part of the world in which the temple was erected. Palestine was a country of some 10,000 square miles, made up of 6,000 square miles in Western Palestine and 3,000 square miles in Eastern Palestine. All of Western Palestine was smaller than the state of Massachusetts. Those inclined to give a guess of the estimate of the cost of the temple place it at ten to twenty billions of dollars. All of the material, precious metals and precious stones were assembled within a period of comparatively few years and apparently coming largely from outside of Palestine.

We should try asking the state of Vermont how it would go about the job of raising that amount of wealth to go into construction of a single building. The answer would probably make us doubt the accuracy of any figures given us as to the fantastic cost of the world's most famous edifice, King Solomon's Temple.

No one wrote a description of the temple until long after it had been plundered of its wealth; hence we well may ask whether there is an acceptable basis upon which to estimate its cost, even though we may feel certain it was high enough to be a terrific burden upon the taxpayers.

This building was constructed by no tool of iron. We read in the Holy Bible, I Kings, Chapter 6, Verse 7: "And the house, when it was in building was built of stone made ready before it was brought thither so that there was neither hammer, nor axe, nor any tool of iron, heard in the house while it was in building."

This feature is retained Masonically in the our present day monitorial working, which tells us that: From sacred history we also learn that, "There was not heard the sound of axe, hammer, or any tool of iron in the house while it was in building." Anderson Masonic Manual

We then ask, "Why were metal tools prohibited?" The answer being the better to show the ingenuity of the craft in those days, for although the materials were prepared at so great a distance, when they were put together; each part fitted so exact a nicety that it seemed the work of the Great Architect of the Universe rather than that of mortal man.

eteran ABC Radio Networks commentator Paul Harvey has offered some kind words for Amateur Radio: "America's quiet warriors are the legion of ham radio operators, 700,000 of them, who are always at ready for backup duty in emergencies—amateur, unpaid, uncelebrated, civilian radio operators, during and after floods and fires and tornadoes," Harvey said. 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


WORDS OF WISDOM FROM KING SOLOMON

The Square & Compasses

hese two symbols have been so long and so universally combined - to teach us, as says an early ritual, "to square our actions and to keep them within due

bounds," they are so selkept together, either as jewel worn by the Master Past Master - that they recognized as the proper just as the triple tau is of



the passion cross of a Knights Templar.

So universally has this symbol been recognized, even by the profane world, as the peculiar characteristic of Freemasonry, that it has been made in the United States the subject of a legal decision. A manufacturer of flour having made, in 1873, an application to the U.S. Patent Office for permission to adopt the square and compasses as a trade-mark, the Commissioner of Patents refused the permission on the ground that the mark was a Masonic symbol.

"If this emblem," said Mr. J.M. Thacher, of the Commissioner, "were something other than precisely what it is - either less known, less significant, or fully and universally understood - all this might readily be admitted. But, considering its peculiar character and relation to the public, an anomalous question is presented. There can be no doubt that this device, so commonly worn and employed by Masons, has an established mystic significance, universally recognized as existing; whether comprehended by all or not, is not material to this issue. In view of the magnitude and extent of the Masonic organization, it is impossible to divest its symbols, or at least this particular symbol perhaps the best known of all - of its ordinary signification, wherever displayed, either as an arbitrary character or otherwise. It will be universally understood, or misunderstood, as having a Masonic significance; and, therefore, as a trade-mark, must constantly work deception. Nothing could be more mischievous than to create as a monopoly, and uphold by the power of law, anything so calculated, as applied to purposes of trade, to be misinterpreted, to mislead all classes, and to constantly foster suggestions of mystery in affairs of business."

In a religious work by John Davies, entitled *Summa Totalis*, or *All in All and the Same Forever*, printed in 1607, we find an illusion to the square and compasses by a profane in a really Masonic sense. The author, who proposes to describe mystically the form of the Deity, says in his dedication:

"Yet I this forme of formelesse Deity, Drewe by the Squire and Compasse of our Creed."

In Masonic symbolism, the Square and Compasses refer to the Mason's duty to the Craft and to himself; hence it is properly a symbol of brotherhood, and there significantly adopted as the badge or token of the Fraternity.

Berage, in his work on the high degrees (*les plus secrets Mysteres des Hauts Grades*), gives a new interpretation to the symbol. He says: "The square and compasses represent the

Masonic Stones of the Washington Monument

By 1854, the Washington National Monument society had exhausted its funds and all work stopped at the 150-foot level. Turmoil within the Society, bad economic times, and the fury of the coming Civil War and its aftermath halted monument construction for 22 years. There is still a discernible line between courses of differing stonework indicating the resumption of Monument construction, funded now by Congress, on August 2, 1876, and spurred on by the centennial celebration of the Declaration of Independence. The Army Corps of Engineers carried on construction of the monument until its completion in 1885. Whether or not Society Secretary John Carrol Brent was moved by the letter from the Lodge in Roxbury, Massachusetts, he began to again send another solicitation to Masonic bodies and other fraternal orders. Between July and September 1874 over two hundred pledges were received by the Society from every part of the country, primarily from the Masons, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Red Men, and other fraternal bodies. By April 15, 1875, 211 Masonic lodges across the country had responded to Brent's call including the Grand Lodges of Florida, Illinois, Ohio, and Massachusetts, the last three named Grand Lodges giving \$1,000 each. Mithras Lodge of Perfection, A.A.S.R., Washington D.C. made a contribution as did 24 Royal Arch Chapters and 5 Commanderies. These stones today may be seen by the visitor who takes scheduled tours walking down the interior staircase of the monument. The walk down is a bit long and tedious and suitable only for the athletically inclined. Monument visitors may inquire about these walking tours by calling the Washington Monument Ranger

Station at 202-426-6841. The National Park Service hopes to install a glass window elevator so that all visitors may view the 193 memorial stones as they make the five-minute elevator ascension to the top of the Monument.

union of the Old and New Testaments. None of the high degrees recognize this interpretation, although their symbolism of the two implements differs somewhat from that of symbolic Masonry. The square is with them perculiarly appropriated to the lower degrees, as founded on the operative art; while the compasses, as an implement of higher character and uses, is attributed to the degrees, which claim to have a more elevated and philosophical foundation. Thus they speak of the initiate, when he passes from the Blue Lodge to the Lodge of Perfection, as 'passing from the square to the compasses,' to indicate a progressive elevation in his studies. Yet even in the high degrees, the square and compasses combined retain their primitive signification as a symbol of brotherhood and as a badge of the Order."

AM Radio Station Dinged for \$9000

\$9,000 fine against WRKQ - AM in Madisonville, Tennessee, has been affirmed by the Federal Communications Commission. The regulatory agency says that WRKQ allegedly failed at least once to identify itself by call sign. Also that it operated at night with daytime power and failed to adequately attenuate its second harmonic.

The harmonic is a rather interesting issue here. WRKQ operates on 1250 kHz. The FCC says that its second harmonic falls squarely on WWV's authorized frequency of 2.5 MHz. The FCC says that it measured WRKQ's second harmonic down at only -55 dB per centimeter whereas -70 dB is required by the rules.


